


- Industrial accidents

- Will be different in each community one size does not fit all
- Improves communication between residents
- Supports residents and businesses during an emergency
- Supports effective sharing of information and relevant resources
- Provides a voice for the community in discussions around risks they may face.

Emergency plan to support vulnerable villagers during cold snap

AN emergency meeting is being held tonight (Monday) to ensure vulnerable villagers are protected during the cold snap.

Milverton Parish Council is activating its emergency plan in view of the extreme cold **weather** forecast for this week.

Parish clerk Gwil Wren said: "The primary purpose is to ensure that elderly and vulnerable residents are protected during the impending cold snap.

"The Parish Council Emergency Committee will be working with the vicar, the Rev Helene Stainer, to ensure that those in the community without close support are looked after and do not want for warmth or hot food.

Plans, people & capabilities



Environment Agency Flood Wardens

- Volunteers trained to help and prepare people in local communities at risk of flooding.
- Help prepare **community flood plans**.
- Vital link between a local community and those responsible for responding to a flood.

Before

- Identify problem areas within your community
- Identify vulnerable people and properties
- Write a community flood plan
- Monitor watercourses within the community
- Encourage sign up to free Flood Warnings

During

- Communicate the risk of flooding within the community
- Help co-ordinate the community flood plan.
- Heed emergency services advice at all times.
- Share information from the Environment Agency and emergency services with residents.
- Encourage residents to take action.
- Collect flood event information.



- Assist in the post-flood clear up if required.
- Continue to act as a communication channel.
- Collect post-flood data and photos.
- Assist in the review of the community flood plan.

Somerset prepared Place of safety

What is it?

- Secure environment for your community during an emergency
- Somewhere that is able to provide care and comfort at short notice







Each Place of Safety will have:

- 24-hour access
- Disabled access

Toilets

□ Heating

- Light refreshments available
- □ If needed, assistance from Local Authority/Voluntary Agencies

What are the benefits?

- Venues close to community
- □ Venues are well known locally
- Community can open venue themselves
- □ Evacuees are supported by people they know
- Details held by Civil Contingencies Unit


Place of Safety Venue Identification Sticker

The aim of the Partnership is to support individuals, communities and businesses in Somerset to be better prepared for emergencies through:

- Clear Information & Resources
- Ensuring communities have access to the information they need to prepare effectively
- Stronger Partnerships
- Working together with communities to understand their needs
- Incident Readiness
- Ensuring communities are prepared for emergencies and better able to recover

Somerset Prepared aims will be achieved through:

• Raising awareness of local risk within Somerset amongst partners, communities and businesses;

• Providing advice, guidance and support to locally led community resilience initiatives;

• Providing resilience networking and information sharing platforms for community groups through meetings, events and supporting technology;

• Supporting partner agencies in delivery of community resilience initiatives;

and

• Sharing information and coordinating activity between member organisations

Somerset Prepared small grant scheme

The Somerset Prepared partnership Small Grants Fund is available to assist with the cost of small capital items and associated training that directly supports activity described in a Community Emergency Plan or Community Flood Plan. Applications to the fund are open to any Parish/Town Council or formally constituted community group within the administrative county of Somerset.

Somerset Prepared small grant scheme conditions:

- 1. Applicants must be formal or constituted community groups with a registered bank account and be able to provide evidence of each upon request.
- 2. Applicants must represent a local community and use grants in such a way that provides benefit to all its members.
- 3. The group must have emergency arrangements in place or under development, such as a community emergency plan or flood plan.
- 4. The maximum grant payable is £5,000, the average sum awarded per application is approximately £3,000.
- 5. A minimum funding contribution of 20% is required through other local fundraising measures, should you have difficulties raising this sum please get in touch.
- 6. Applications for a defibrillator must be discussed prior to submission and require a 50% contribution through local fundraising. If you are considering this please contact info@somersetprepared.org.uk.
- 7. Grants cannot be used for goods and services that are the responsibility of public bodies to provide.
- 8. On-going maintenance of purchased items is the sole responsibility of the named group awarded grant funding.
- 9. Applicants must sign to confirm they have read and understood the Small Grant Fund Advice & Guidance and Terms & Conditions.
